## Highlights from the 13th December meeting and Christmas party at Meadway Hall, Compton Dundon

Only 17 members braved the elements on Wednesday evening, which was a shame as Kay Wych, accompanied by her husband, Bill, kept us well entertained with her account of how she became a 16th century kitchen maid.

**Born and bred in Glastonbury, in sight of the Tor, Kay's early career was at a local factory working in the office, having been brought up to the sound of typewriters clacking as her grandmother with whom she lived, was a teacher of shorthand and typing. Quickly realising that her colleagues spoke the Queens English whereas Kay had a distinct Somerset accent (nothing wrong with that) Kay decided to improve her diction and joined a drama class.**

Glastonbury Arts Club set her on her way, appearing in plays at Strode Theatre, and open air theatre in the grounds of Glastonbury Abbey. Kay said think of **life's events being governed by three seeds. The first seed Kay put in the pot was taking part in drama** The second was to study history, particularly of the local area. The third seed was archaeology.

Slowly, as she talked, Kay transformed herself into a 16th century maid, donning the appropriate clothes. Adopting the name of Alyce, she wore only blue or ochre as, at that time, only the rich were allowed to wear red. The material would be wool or linen. Fleas were commonplace and little bonnets were known as nit caps.

Alyce made things to sell, a salve for the piles made from lesser celandine roots.

Gradually the story emerged of the dissolution of the monasteries and the effect this had on people such as Alyce. Kay was joined by Bill, appropriately dressed as the King's Officer, who confirmed the arrest of Bishop Whiting, who was subsequently hung, drawn and quartered.

Angela thanked Kay, adding that the wearing of the costumes had added to the authenticity of the telling of the events in the past.

## Social Housing at Home Field Close

Following the recent vacancy for Social Housing at Home Field Close the Parish Council sought clarification of the application process under the Choice Based Letting system.

The Section 106 Agreement (S106) stipulates that applicants need to have lived in the Village in the last 12 months, have family association or have employment in the Village.

You have to be registered on Homefinder before the property is listed.

Hastoe Housing Association *will* write to the Parish Council in advance to notify us that the house is coming available and to advise anyone that may be interested to register on Homefinder. (they don't have to notify us - they do this out of courtesy)

Under the Choice Based Letting System the property is advertised to everyone registered on Homefinder Somerset ([homefindersomerset.co.uk](http://homefindersomerset.co.uk)).

Hastoe (The Landlord) receive the list of applicants in priority banding - in order of time registered on Homefinder. They look at Band A first - (Band A require emergency accommodation/homeless), then Band B etc. The first person they come to (i.e. been registered the longest) that meets the criteria of the S106 (local connection) is offered the house. But *if there is* someone in Band A that registered last week (and has family connections) *they* will be ahead of someone in Band B that registered last year.

Compton Dundon is the only Parish that actually gets to verify that that person is who they say they are - this is due to an issue 10 years ago. This is not stipulated in the S106, but done out courtesy following the problems that arose 10 years ago.

# Somerset Wildlife Trust

Somerset Wildlife Trust will use newly launched Wildlife Trust guidelines to help secure the provision of nature-friendly, inspirational homes and developments, and put wildlife back into our towns' natural places and green spaces



**11<sup>th</sup> January 2018** marked the launch of a new report by the Wildlife Trusts called **'Homes for people and wildlife - how to build housing in a nature-friendly way'** at a time when the Government has recently committed to building a further 300,000 homes a year until 2022. This means that about 36 square miles will be given over to new housing developments annually (*\*that's an area larger than Brighton & Hove every year*).

The Wildlife Trusts believe that the natural environment must be put at the heart of planning in order to give the government a chance of meeting its commitment to be *the first generation to leave the environment in a better state than we found it* - and to build new homes and communities that people enjoy living in.

Letter from the Right Reverend Peter Hancock, Bishop of Bath and Wells - January 2018



In Ancient Roman religion the god of beginnings and endings was Janus. In art and sculpture he is therefore usually depicted as having two faces, since he looks both to the future and to the past.

And it is generally believed that the month of January is named after Janus. But looking back and looking forward are also both very much part of the Christian tradition and at the start of a New Year this can be a very helpful thing to do. We so often rush from one thing to the next, from one week to the next from one birthday to the next, from one Christmas to the next and fail to stop, to remember and to give thanks. It is certainly not sentimental or maudlin to look back and to remember some of the people who have been instrumental in our lives. Our parents, our teachers, our friends, colleagues at work, neighbours, people with whom we have shared the special moments of our lives. Sometimes we will have photos to remind us of them, or presents that perhaps they have given us. Sometimes however we have to rely on our memories. And as we remember we can give thanks for their example, for the love they gave us or the things they taught us.

**Paul, writing to the Philippians said: ‘Dear Friends, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable or excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things’. Sometimes the news seems to be filled with stories that are depressing, violent or worrying. But each of us has a fund of memories which remind us of the goodness, grace and love which we have received from other people. Those people and the example they showed us give us hope and inspire us ‘to lead lives worthy of the Lord’.**

**In that same letter to the Philippians Paul encourages his readers to ‘live up to the example they have received’ and to strain towards what lies ahead. He sees the Christian life as a race and speaks of ‘pressing on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called him’. That prize is Jesus himself. His eyes are on what lies ahead, on all that is to come and eventually to the joys of heaven.**

So as we begin a New Year let us give thanks for all that we have learnt about the Lord in years gone by. Let us give thanks that God walks with us and watches over us now. And let us look forward to the future, secure and confident of **Jesus’ promise that he is with us always** – in everything and through everything - until the very end of time itself.

May the Lord bless you and watch over you in all that 2018 may bring.
