Livestock Worrying

Unfortunately a further report was received in April: -



“Another sheep has been killed by dogs below the Hood Monument. It was done either first thing this morning or late yesterday. It was obviously by large dogs as the carcass had been dragged. There were footprints so the owners obviously know what their dogs have done. If anyone has seen or knows of walkers who might have been there at that time the police would be interested to hear of any sightings.”

Remember to follow the Countryside Code especially during the lambing season. If your dog attacks livestock, you could end up being responsible for offences including criminal damage and sheep worrying, as well as potential prosecution for offences under the Dangerous Dogs Act. Farmers have the right to shoot dogs that are worrying or attacking livestock.



Appeal for Witnesses

Police are appealing for witnesses following a collision involving four cars in Somerset.

The incident happened at approximately 5.15pm on Wednesday 28 March on the B3151 between Somerton and Kingsdon. The vehicles involved were a blue Ford Fiesta, a blue Peugeot 307, a yellow Seat Ibiza and a green Volkswagen Polo. A woman in her 30s sadly lost her unborn child following the incident. A two-year-child also suffered life-changing injuries. Police are keen to speak to anyone who witnessed the collision and in particular, the manner in which the Ford Fiesta was being driven before it happened. Highlights from the 11th April meeting at Meadway Hall, Compton Dundon

How have developments in modes of transport affected ladies fashions? This question and many more were answered by Yvonne Bell in her amusing and informative talk, Hobble Skirts and Harem Pants.

Yvonne told us she had paid a previous visit to Meadway Hall when she gave a talk entitled Grandmas Garden to the local Gardening Club in the main hall and as our meeting was held in a side room due to our diminishing numbers, Yvonne felt she had somehow been demoted.

Spending her married life in an Edwardian house which was furnished with cheap furniture and pictures purchased at auction sales and the fact she was born in 1938, Yvonne says she feels she can almost touch the history of the Edwardian age. Following the death of Queen Victoria, the Edwardian age was ushered in with Edward VII and the beautiful, elegant Queen Alexandra. Alexandra loved soft materials, pastel shades, her favourite colours being those of the sweet peas. Yvonne has a comprehensive collection of magazines of the age, the Lady and Punch, to name but two, and obtains much of her information from these magazines.

The fashionable shape for ladies of broad shoulders, big bosoms, tiny waist, flat stomach and protruding bottoms was achieved with the wearing of very strict corsetry. All this changed in the 1900s ladies wanted freedom, to ride bicycles, fly in aeroplanes, and in 1909 Wilber Wright was asked by Mrs Edith Burr to be allowed to ride in his aeroplane. He agreed and when the downdraught caused her skirts to ride high, this adventurous lady grabbed a piece of rope and wound it around the bottom of her skirt. Mrs Burr was the First Lady to fly in an aeroplane and the flight lasted all of two minutes and seven seconds.

On alighting, Mrs Burr hobbled due to her walking being restricted by the rope on her skirt, and thus was born the fashionable hobble skirt. Everyone wanted one, the wearing of these skirts caused many problems, the platforms of tram cars were lowered because ladies could not step high enough to get on the tram,

and one lady was tragically killed following a fall whilst trying to get out of her automobile.

Harem Pants came about following the coming of the Ballet Russe to London, productions featured extravagant scenery and colourful costumes, never previously seen in ballet productions. Turkish themes, and the appearance of the principal dancer dressed as a black slave wearing harem pants, caused a sensation.

Harem pants were worn under skirts and had the appearance of bloomers. Cartoons in Punch making fun of ladies were commonplace.

However these looser casual forms of dress were very popular, being worn for golf, cycling, and skiing and dancing with the introduction of Rag Time and Tango, such a contrast to the Victorian minuets. These drastic changes led to the complaint that women were dressing and looking more like a man than a woman.

Anna Lisa then took us on a most fascinating tour of the stables where we saw horses working and learnt a lot about the life of a racing stable. With nearly 200 horses and around 80 staff it is an extremely busy operation. We were taken by "battle wagon" to the gallops and saw the "fourth lot" of mainly 2 year old fillies and colts working up the gallops. Just like human boys and girls the colts go first so that they aren't distracted by the fillies and they tend to behave better in this order! *(Continued on page 8)*



Highclere Castle is a wonderful house. Major re-building works in the 18th and 19th centuries converted the 12th century house into a classical Georgian Mansion. The Earls of Carnarvon have been associated with the house since the Herbert family inherited it in the 17th century. The current 8th Earl and his Countess partially live in the house and are very much a part of the day-to-day workings of the house.

Superb vaulted and baroque ceilings, glorious Italian silk embroidered wall panels, elegant furniture and family portraits fill the house with colour and history. During WW1 the house was turned into a hospital for returning wounded soldiers and during WW2 evacuees from London were housed there. **The Egyptian Exhibition in the house covers the 5th Earl's finding of Tutankhamun and his treasures.** In each room there are pictures of scenes from the **“Downton Abbey” series, showing the actors in the fashions and with the furniture of that era.** Alongside current family photographs it makes for a very interesting slice of history.


